So, if you are in search of a treasure chest of tie knowledge, mark your calendar today to join producers and users of crossties Oct. 13-15 at the Renaissance Harbor Place Hotel for one whale of a meeting.

Need to know more? Well, read on intrepid traveler and find some of the jewels that are planned for you.

First, even before the conference officially kicks off on the evening of Oct. 13, members can explore Baltimore's many Inner Harbor sites. While the annual golf tournament is played (more on that later), attendees and guests can climb aboard a chartered water taxi and be guided to some of the area's finest points of interest.

Then, finally, the tour concludes at The National Aquarium of Baltimore. This is Baltimore's leading attraction, hosting more than 1.6 million visitors annually. The exhibits here house more than 16,000 creatures, including stingrays, sharks, monkeys, sloths, iguanas, dolphins and much more.

Then, the day tops off with the first official conference event, the RTA presidential reception hosted by this year's president, Gary Williams of Koppers Inc.

There's even more in store for attendees the next day. In addition to the stellar list of presenters (see complete agenda, page 11), attendees will hear from Dennis Avery of the Heartland Institute during a keynote luncheon address entitled, "The Railroad Industry and the Carbon Trap." Invited guest Deputy Administrator of the FRA, Karen Rae, is also expected to come to the podium to review the Obama Administration's rail stimulus package with a focus on high-speed rail initiatives.

There will be a hardwood sawmill session devoted to the current state of the industry and what can be expected over the next year for these vital companies. Tabletop exhibits will also be set up, and given the success of last year's vendor-mercials, you can expect to see more quality information from exhibitors during the business sessions.


The evening will bring yet another spectacular banquet event. Based upon a nautical theme, guests and members alike will experience a true Maryland Crab Feast.

A cultural and civic treasure, this vantage point will be the first stop along the tour. *Ft. McHenry* is a military fort and national monument. During the War of 1812, the British bombarded it, but failed to capture the city it defended. Francis Scott Key witnessed the battle while being held aboard a British ship and the sight of the US flag flying above the fort inspired him to write "The Star Spangled Banner." During the Civil War, the fort was a Union prison camp and was deserted in 1933 when it became a National Monument and Historic Shrine. *Fells Point* is the next stop along the way. Known to locals as one of Baltimore's most eclectic neighborhoods, cozy lunch spots and unique shops are just waiting to be explored! *The National Aquarium of Baltimore* was opened in 1981 and was constructed during the urban renewal period of Baltimore. It has an annual attendance of 1.6 million to see its collection of 16,500 specimens of 660 different species. The tour will last from 9 a.m. until approximately 4:30 PM on Tuesday, Oct. 13 - with lunch & shopping on your own at *Fells Point* from noon until 2:30.
